Kevin was one of the very first participants in Connecting Champions. When we first met, Kevin told us how much he liked baseball, so we decided to find him a local baseball player who could be his mentor.

But as Kevin and I got to know each other more, it became clear to me that Kevin's true passion was helping those around him. He and I bonded over giving back to the community and he was always the first person to sign up to volunteer with us.

I was still young and, in a lot of ways, Kevin mentored me. He taught me our organization wasn't about finding some flashy person who could be a mentor it was about creating a shared vision and inspiring each other along the way. We call what we do "friendship building" because it really does go both ways. Kevin is a lifelong friend for me.

Today, Kevin is in law school and has become a mentor for a young woman in Connecting Champions — he is the first participant in our program to ever become a mentor himself.

## BAYLEE West Virginia


Need I say more? This is one of my all-time favorite pictures in Connecting Champions!

Amidst a pandemic, we opened our second ever in-hospital location, in partnership with WVU Medicine Children's Hospital. Baylee and Ariella became one of our first friendships, and they would video chat every week or two about sea creatures and life.

Upon first glance, you'd think this is a picture of mentor Ariella, an aquarist, teaching Baylee about jellyfish. But wait! It is actually a picture of Baylee giving Ariella a lesson on jellyfish!

As much as Baylee loved learning, she craved the opportunity to be the teacher, too. Before her visits with Ariella, she would often make a PowerPoint Presentation of different sea life and share her knowledge.

These two have taught me the power of having a friend who "speaks your language," and how it only takes one adult to help a teen feel proud of who they are.







This summer, my coworker Sophia and I had the joy of visiting AJ & Tracy at Tracy's art studio. AJ is an extremely talented digital artist who is starting her career, and Tracy has been a mentor and friend along the way.

About halfway through our visit, they hid their tablets to pull one of their pieces up. Why was it so secretive?

When they turned around, we saw that they had both recreated our logo — each with their own artistic touch — to surprise us for our 10th birthday. Oh my, was that a moment! It still brings genuine tears to my eyes.

A] & Tracy have taught us how critical a mentor can be to a young adult entering survivorship. It's not just about rebuilding confidence or talking about something you love. It's about acquiring the resources, skills, and knowledge you need to take that first step forward after treatment.

15-year-old Maddie plays volleyball and guitar but those hobbies do not compare to her love for science. When she met Michigan State University professor and researcher, Ron, a whole new world of possibility opened for the high school freshman.

Maddie and Ron spend their meetings together discussing all things science. Ron is able to share what a day in his life looks like and invites Maddie to ask as many questions as she has. Through her mentorship with Ron, she is able to learn more about the subject she is so passionate about and hopes to pursue following high school graduation.

Maddie's passion for science comes from a desire to help others in her own way. Combining that with Ron's research centered around cancer, it was a perfect fit. Maddie finds the cells under the microscope to be fascinating, and she is impressed by the incredible cancer cells that Ron presents to her during their visits together. Their conversations revolve around finding a cure for cancer, and Ron has even given Maddie virtual tours of his lab, something they hope to do in-person very soon.

The two friends have also connected by discussing their favorite musical artists, but the conversation always makes its way back to Maddie asking questions and learning more about the science field.

Connecting Champions Friendship Champion Coy Thompson has seen their relationship grow incredibly over the past few months and noticed how much Maddie enjoys learning about Ron's work and the science world as a whole. "She's a sponge in terms of the science stuff," says Coy. "She's all in on it."

Maddie and Ron have been meeting every other week and do not plan to end their friendship anytime soon. Next on Maddie's to-do list is to analyze one of Ron's research studies and translate it to the language of non-scientists so everybody can understand the findings. In addition to the research study, Ron is helping Maddie decide which classes to take in school to be the most successful she can be in the science field.

Maddie and Ron's friendship continues to grow every single time they meet. Ron is giving Maddie the opportunity to see what life is like beyond her diagnosis. Together, they are carving a bright future for a girl with a burning passion to help others.

## CASPER WHAT DO YOU WANT TO BE WHEN YOU GROW UP

13 years old



Casper and his mentor, Jess, have a lot of things in common: they both love art, they are left-handed, and they both love anime. When these two talented people work together, anything is possible.

13-year-old Casper loves art and drawing but after being diagnosed with cancer, he lost that desire to draw all day long. However, his love for art came back to life when he met his new best friend, Jess.

Jess is a full-time tattoo artist at Kyklops Tattoo & Body Piercing in Pittsburgh's South Side. In addition to their tattooing, they work on canvas, paper, and digital works. One of their main passions that connects them to Casper is their shared love for anime.

During their biweekly virtual meetings, Casper and Jess spend their time together presenting their artwork to one another. These assignments, predetermined at the previous meeting, allow Casper and Jess to show off what they have been working on since the last time they met. Their art is usually focused around anime and the characters that star in Casper's favorite shows. When presenting their works, they are able to discuss their different drawing techniques, such as the way they made their characters' eyes or shaped their hair and faces.

Something fun that the two friends have begun to do is split sheet or art trading. They each take a piece of paper and draw a line down the middle. They then draw on one half of their own paper and, when they are finished, Connecting Champions West Virginia Program Coordinator and Data Analyst Sloane gives them the other's paper. They take their friend's artwork and complete it on the other side of the page so they are able to work on art together despite meeting over a computer screen.

For Casper's 13th birthday, Jess sent him a drawing that they made of Casper's favorite characters from one his favorite animes, My Hero Academia.

Casper holds the piece very close to his heart and his admiration of Jess is evident to everyone he knows: "His eyes light up," said Sloane. "You can see that he is himself and he's relaxed and he's with someone who really gets him and what he loves and what he's passionate about!"

One of Sloane's favorite parts of their friendship is Jess's ability to make Casper laugh. Jess is always the last to log on to their video calls, logging in at 9:33 for a 9:30 call, always doing something crazy as their entrance. Whether they are dressed as an anime character or enter the frame from a weird angle, Jess always keeps Casper laughing.

In October, Casper and Jess met for the first time in-person in Pittsburgh at Kyklops. "When Casper first found out that he was actually going to come to Pittsburgh and meet Jess, he was jumping all over the place, literally, which is a hard thing for him to do since he's even having trouble walking due to his chemotherapy."

"We come to Jess's shop and Jess meets us at the door. They hug each other and Casper semi-starts crying and he's like 'I'm so happy to meet you! I'm so happy to meet you!' He was totally thrilled that he was able to meet jess. He was very excited to meet this person that brought art back into his life." - Casper's Grandmother

Jess came to Casper's aid when he needed them most, invigorating an urge to draw that had gone dormant since his cancer diagnosis. "Jess really helps bring Casper out of his shell and has entirely helped restore Casper's confidence and abilities in drawing because now Casper will draw while he's in the hospital," said Sloane. "Not just things for our meetings but he will just draw randomly. I think that good work is being done here on Jess's part of helping restore that confidence in Casper."
